Question 2. One area where the lines between speech and writing, and formal and informal language are commonly blurred is in the register of advertising language. Here, writers and speakers aim to draw the intended audience's attention to key features of their discourse and influence the audience by using particular language patterns. By analysing the various grammatical structures used, we are able to assess and evaluate what a writer or speaker is trying to achieve.

Consider the Army recruiting advertisement found in Appendix D (reproduced below) and answer the following questions:

- a. What features typical of spoken language are found in this written text?
List them all and give examples using line numbers.
- b. What is the relative formality of the text? What language features convey the level of formality?
Again the response only needs to be brief and use a list format with examples and line numbers.
- c. What effect does the use of these language features have on the reader? Only one or two sentences needed.
